How does my child know the expectations of the school? Our school vision promotes **the 15 'Legacy' Principles** that create the behaviour culture within our school. We have high expectations and our staff are consistent and fair. The principles are actively communicated daily to encourage all pupils to reflect the values of the school. We have zero tolerance regarding bullying of any kind. We teach our children about bullying and what it looks like. We treat all incidents seriously, quickly and effectively.

What will happen if my child says they are being bullied?

Ring school 01609 772657 and let them know! We have an emotional check in at the entrance of each classroom so the class teacher can manage any behaviour issues that may upset the safe learning environment.

> What happens if my child displays poor behaviour in the classroom?

Staff are trained in managing poor behaviour. They will respond promptly to any disruptions in the classroom, in order to maintain a calm, safe learning environment and safeguard all pupils. If poor behaviour persists, then the pupil will be asked to see Mrs Byrne, and parents/carers may be contacted.

What if my child comes to school upset/angry? We value our home, school Partnership and the support that we receive from you. We hold communication vital to the success of our partnership and hope that you would help to reinforce our behaviour expectations at home.

What should my child do to help?

We have an open-door policy and we are all here to help. But if you have any concerns, please contact your child's teacher or Who can I talk to if I am worried about my child's behaviour?

What can I as a parent, do to help?

- Promote the 'Legacy' principles in school at all times.
- Avoid causing disruption in classrooms and during break times
- Strive to 'Stand out for the Right Reasons'.
- Talk if something/someone is upsetting you talk to an adult!
- Making school a happy and welcoming place to be
- School merit reward system, from EYFS to Year 6
- Weekly 'Standing out for the Right Reasons' awards.
- Communicating with parents about their child's behaviour
- Helping and working closely with families that need support
- Looking carefully at behaviour data to spot patterns and areas to improve
